
WONDERful News!

State Grade Level Assessment Information

- Students in grades 3 and 4 take annual Ohio state assessments in English language arts and math.
- Third graders take the English language arts test twice during the school year once in the fall, and once in the spring.
- All other tests for third and fourth grade are given in the spring of the school year.
- Students in third grade must score a 44 on the reading portion of the test, or 672 on all parts of the test combined to be promoted to fourth grade. (Students may also earn promotion from third to fourth grade by scoring a 196 or higher on the MAP reading assessment by the end of the 2017-2018 school year.)
